

Discussion Questions

1. On page XII, Dr. Piper writes, “In all my reading of Bunyan, what has gripped me most is his suffering and how he responded to it—what it made of him, and what it might make of us.” What do you think he means when he asks what Bunyan’s suffering might make of us?
2. Bunyan received an ordinary education for the poor, which really wasn’t much education at all. Still, *The Pilgrim’s Progress* is one of the world’s best selling and most popular books ever. If it wasn’t his refined English education that made him such a great writer, what was it?
3. John Bunyan wasn’t the only one to endure sorrow. Consider his wife, Elizabeth. What was it do you think, that gave her such strength?

3. Doing the right thing, more specifically following Christ, is often a hard thing to do. Christian was given many opportunities to turn back, and plenty of excuses and persuasions from Obstinate, but he kept on. Why was Christian so determined? What do you think fueled his earnest desire and commitment to leave?

Discussion Questions

1. Pliable hears of the good things Christian is seeking, and decides to follow him. But when he discovers that this road Christian is taking is difficult and full of trial, he turns back. Are there times when you are easily dissuaded because the task at hand is harder than you imagined?
2. Christian's burden seems heavier after taking Mr. Worldly wiseman's advice. Why do you think this is the case? Whose advice sounded better at first glance, Evangelist or Worldly-wiseman?
3. Why can Mr. Legality offer no hope to Christian? Can he do anything to save himself? What hope does Evangelist offer?
4. What are some of the things the Interpreter shows Christian? What do they mean?

Discussion Questions

1. Christian rejoices in the beginning of chapter five, “He hath given me rest by His sorrow, and life by His death.” Then it tells us, “he stood still awhile to look and wonder; for it was very surprising to him, that the sight of the cross should thus ease him of his burden.” Have you ever stood still awhile to look and wonder at the salvation Christ offers us through His death and resurrection?
2. This month’s hymn is “O Love That Will Not Let Me Go.” The fourth verse sings, “O Cross that liftest up my head, I dare not ask to fly from thee; I lay in dust life’s glory dead, and from the ground there blossoms red, life that shall endless be.” How does this verse apply to Christian’s wonder at the cross?
3. On page 48, Christian tells Formalist and Hypocrisy, “By laws and ordinances you will not be saved, since you came in not by the door. And as for this coat on my back, it was given me by the Lord of the place whither I go; and that, as you say, to cover my nakedness with.” What does Christian’s coat symbolize?

Discussion Questions

1. “To go back is nothing but death; to go forward is fear of death, and life everlasting beyond it. I will yet go forward.” When you face difficulty, how do you want to respond initially? What do you do to remind yourself of the coming glory?
2. Christian struggled up the Hill of Difficulty, often giving into the temptation and falling down. There are times when we fall as well, but what a wondrous thing that God always stands ready to forgive us. What is an example of a time where you “fell” but the Lord was gracious to give you the strength to get back up, and keep moving forward?
3. How does Apollyon seek to discourage Christian in the Valley of Humiliation? What is Christian’s response? How is this true for believers tempted to be weighed down by the guilt and shame of their unfaithful past?
